POSITIONING AT STAKE FOR UNH AND MAINE BU, Northeastern must focus on league play before Beanpot opener

After Boston College vs. Boston University, Hockey East's top rivalry is undoubtedly UNH vs. Maine. The northern counterparts have staged countless memorable battles, particularly since the closing weeks of the 1998-99 season, which culminated with a 3-2 OT win for Maine over UNH in the NCAA championship game. Since that dramatic affair, the teams have split the series with six wins each. Five of those games have been decided by just one goal, and there have also been two ties in that span. Last season, they were especially evenly matched, as each team scored exactly seven goals in their three-game series, which Maine won two games to one, UNH got the last laugh, however, winning its second consecutive Hockey East championship and advancing to its fourth Frozen Four in the last six seasons. Meanwhile, Maine qualified for its fifth consecutive trip to the NCAA postseason.

Both teams remain competitive at the highest levels of play this season. Maine is ranked fourth in the nation in the AHCA poll, just two

They are second and third, respectively, in the Hockey East standings, but Massachusetts and UMass Lowell aren't far behind. That ups the ante for this weekend's series in Orono which will complete their regular season head-to-head play. UNH was looking at a 3-1 deficit just five minutes into their first meeting this season, but scored five unanswered goals to deliver a 6-3 win for their delighted home crowd on Nov. 8.

Northeastern is getting wide-eyed about Monday's Beanpot opener vs. BU, but must first focus on an unusual Thursday face-off. After getting just one point in their first eight Hockey East contests, the Huskies have six points in their last six league games and are back in the hunt for the playoffs. The ninth-place Huskies are clawing for every point they can get, and UMass may be one place they can find some. Though solid at 11-7-5 overall, the Minutemen are only 1-3-2 at home this year in league play.

Boston University must also hold its Beanpot breath until Monday as a match at UMass Lowell is on deck. BU is by no means a lock for the Hockey East playoffs - a 1-0 win over Maine Saturday gave the Terriers a minimum amount of wiggle room over the teams in the lower bracket, but a false move or two will put them quickly on the bottom. Providence is right there with the Terriers, Huskies and Warriors, making it a four-team battle for only three playoff spots. The Friars have the uneviable task of taking on first-place Boston College in Chestnut Hill on Friday before hosting UMass Lowell. Merrimack, meanwhile, has the same draw as Northeastern, visiting Massachusetts on Saturday.
