EAGLES MAKE IT EIGHT STRAIGHT WITH SWEEP OF BU UMass Lowell also remains scorching hot – unbeaten in 11 straight

Looking to end the debate over who's the best team in Hockey East, the Boston College Eagles defeated the Boston University Terriers, 6-3 and 2-0, to complete a weekend sweep and take over first place. Patrick Eaves, Ryan Shannon and Dave Spina each had five points in the sweep to carry the offense. Matti Kaltiainen needed to make just 14 saves to post his second shutout of the season Saturday. Earlier in the week, rookie Cory Schneider notched his first career shutout with 11 saves in a slim 1-0 win at Yale. The Eagles have now won eight straight.

With two games in hand and only two points behind, the UNH Wildcats are geared up for one of the biggest challenges of the season when they visit BC on Saturday. UNH scored eight goals in each of two non-conference games last week. Amazingly, one of those was a loss, 9-8 vs. Dartmouth. The 'Cats rebounded with a convincing 8-2 win over Yale on Saturday.

UMass Lowell swept Merrimack to run its winning streak to five games and unbeaten streak to 11 games. Those wins also lifted the River Hawks into a tie for fifth place, just two weeks re-



TEAM NOTES

Boston College: Patrick Eaves has seven multi-point games this season and also has a modest four-game point streak ... The nation's top-ranked penalty-killing unit (90.8 %) was 16-for-17 in the sweep vs. BU, and also converted one shorthanded goal. The BC power play scored three times in Friday's 6-3 win.

Boston University: Saturday's 2-0 loss to BC marked just fourth time in 22 games this year that the Terriers did not score a power play goal. It was also just the 6th time in the 226-game series history that BU was shut out.

University of Maine: Greg Moore snapped a 10-game drought by scoring on the power play in each game at UMass ... The Black Bears's special teams continued to improve this weekend, going 4-for-12 on the power play and 6-for-7 on the penalty kill.

University of Massachusetts: UMass' rookies again had a strong weekend, accounting for six points in the series vs. the Black Bears ... Peter Trovato has six assists in the last five games, including one each night vs. Maine this past weekend. Trovato was recently named one of five finalists for the prestigious Hockey Humanitarian Award on Jan. 12 ... The Minuteman power play has converted at 35% (7-for-20) over the past five games.

UMass Lowell: UML's 11-game unbeaten streak marks its longest stretch without a loss since a 12-game unbeaten steak (11-0-1) in 1995-96. The five consecutive wins are the most since a nine-game clip in 2001-02 ... Andrew Martin has 15 points in his last 12 games (6-9—15) and a three-game scoring streak ... Despite going only 2-for-13 on the power play this weekend, UML still leads the nation in power play with a 26.1 conversion rate.

Merrimack College: Matt Johnson has a three-game scoring streak, scoring three of Merrimack's last four goals ... Bryan Schmidt (25 points) and Jeff Caron (23) are still the top two scoring defensemen in the nation ... Rookie forward Jordan Fox scored his first career goal on Saturday ... Saturday's loss was the first for Merrimack when leading after two periods. The Warriors are now 6-1-1 when they have the lead at the second intermission.

University of New Hampshire: UNH scored eight goals in back-to-back games, matching a feat accomplished as recently as the 2003 Hockey East quarterfinals. Eighteen of 19 UNH players scored a point over the two games and 12 players earned at least two points on the week. UNH scored eight of its 16 goals in the second period. UNH's offense ranks second in the nation with 4.09 goals per game.

Northeastern University: The Huskies got the most production from its freshman class all season in Saturday's 6-0 win over Providence. Carter Lee had two goals, Josh Robertson had a goal and an assist and Jason Blain notched his first career assist. Robertson also had an assist in a 3-3 tie on Friday ... Jason Guerriero's three-point game on Friday was his seventh multi-point game of the season. NU is 5-1-1 when Guerriero has at least two points.

Providence College: The Providence sophomore class has accounted for 29 of the team's 52 goals ... Five of the Friars' losses have come by one goal ... Providence and Northeastern have skated to four ties in their last six meetings.

WHO'S HOT

• Peter Vetri, UML (Fr. G; Windham, NH) – Unbeaten in his last 10 starts (8-0-2) with a 1.77 GAA and .927 save percentage in that span.

• Boston College Defense and Goaltending – The Eagles are on an eight-game winning streak thanks to a stingy defense, which has allowed just 10 goals in that span (1.25 per game).

• UMass Lowell – Has a five-game winning streak and an 11-game undefeated streak.

• UNH's No. 1 Line – Sean Collins, Preston Callander and Brett Hemingway rank 1-2-3, respectively, in overall scoring among Hockey East players and account for over one-third of UNH's second-ranked offense. The trio has produced 23 points in the last three games.
