Regionals

• Since regional tournament play began in 1992, 35 of the 60 teams that have advanced to the Frozen Four from the eastern regional tournaments have been from Hockey East. Eighteen Hockey East teams have been sent to the western regionals in the same span, but only two of those have advanced to the Frozen Four.

Frozen Four

• Over the last 24 NCAA Tournaments, Hockey East has boasted 30 of the 96 Frozen Four qualifiers, the most of any conference. By comparison:

• At least two Hockey East teams have qualified for the Frozen Four in 15 of the conference's 40 seasons, dominating the competition in that span. By comparison:

Hockey East: 15 times
WCHA: Six times
CCHA: Six times
NCHC: Four times
Big Ten: Three times
ECACH: Two times

Championship Game

• At least one Hockey East team has appeared in the National Championship Game in 21 of the last 32 years. Hockey East was represented by at least one team in the NCAA championship game in each of eight straight years from 1997 to 2004. That is the most consecutive appearances in the title game by any conference since the inception of Hockey East in 1984-85.

• Hockey East has boasted 24 of the 60 teams that have advanced to the championship game since 1993.

• On three occasions (1995, 1999, 2015) the NCAA championship game featured two Hockey East squads. The only three other occurrences of this since the inception of Hockey East in 1984-85 were once each by the WCHA (2005) and ECAC (2013) and NCHC (2017).

• A Hockey East team has won the NCAA championship game in six of the last 15 National Tournaments.

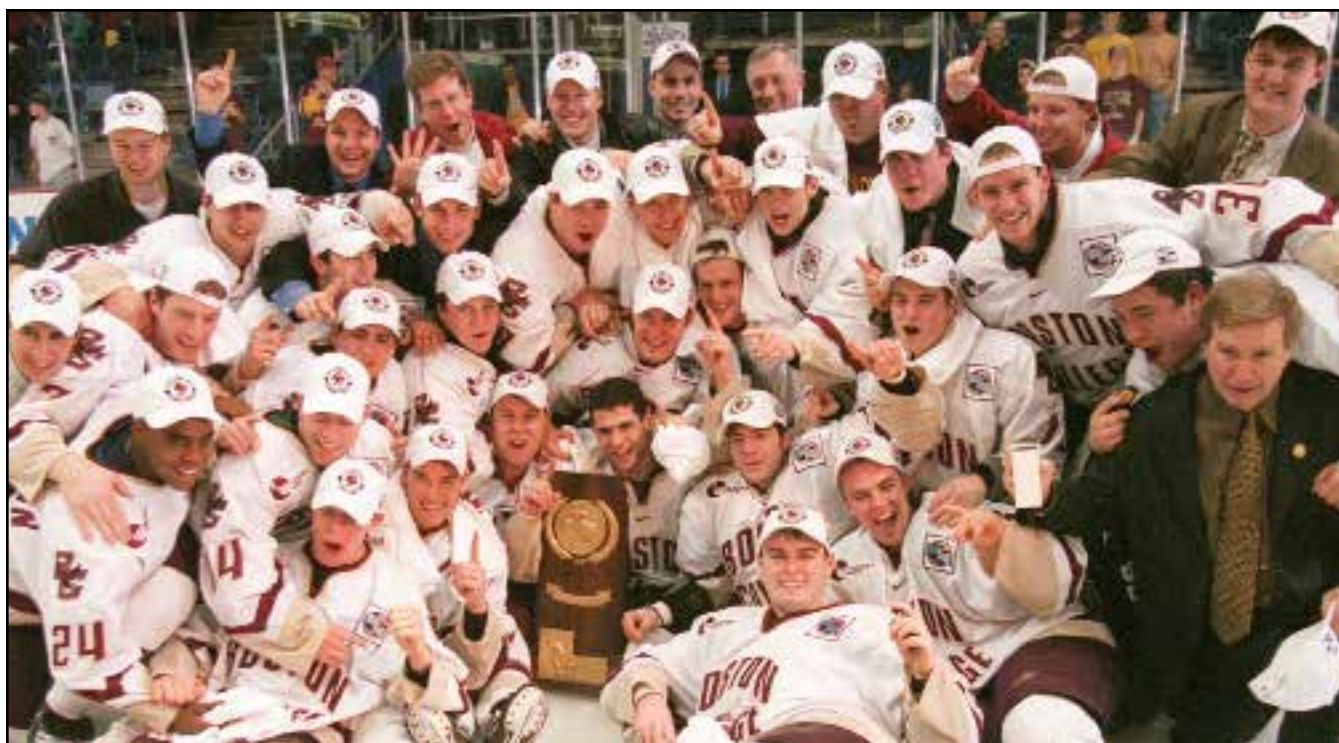

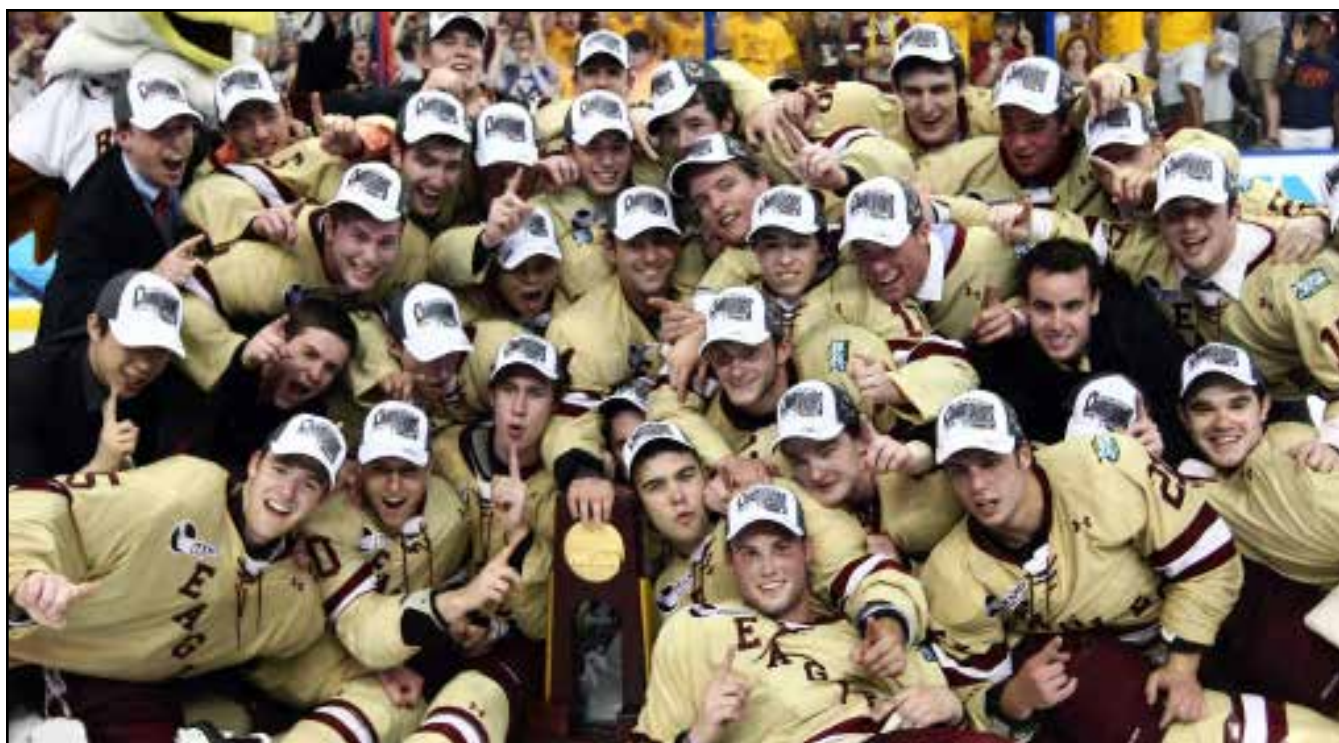

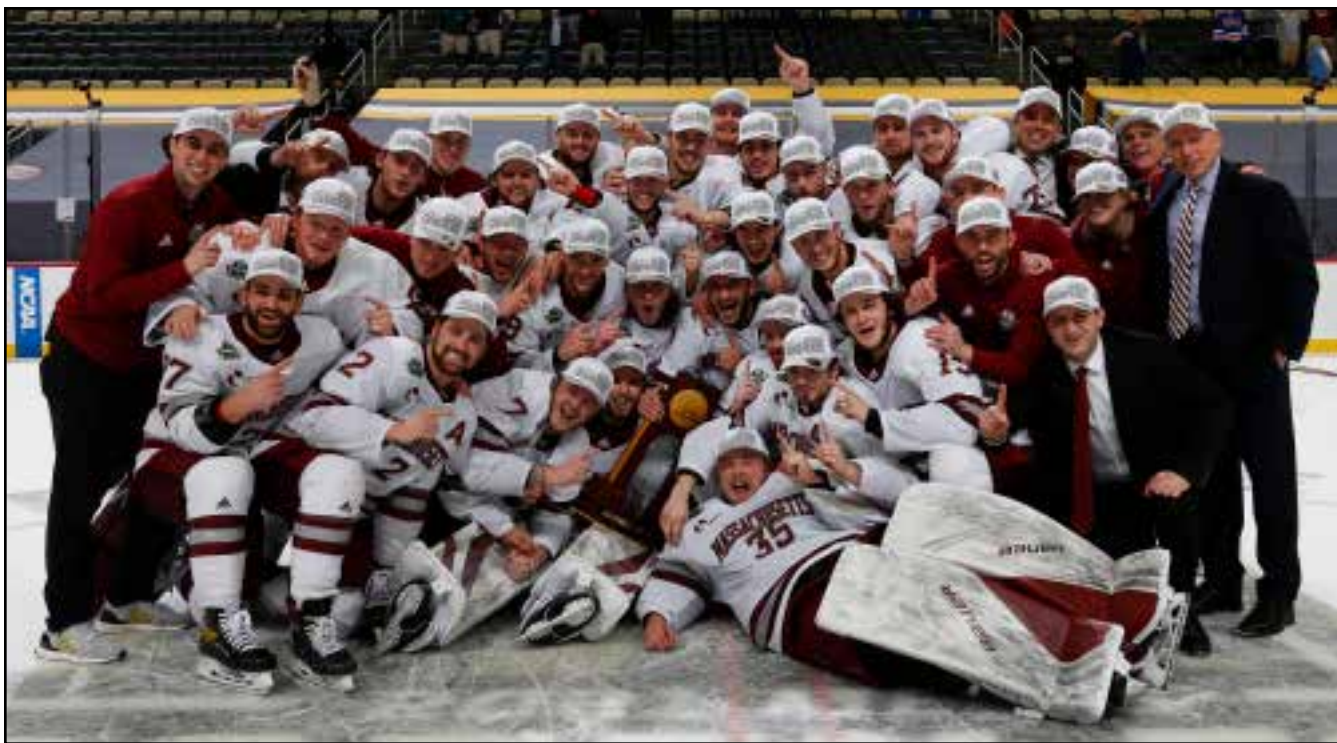
